Mayor's Message

Welcome to the Winter 2024 edition of Look East



Eighteen months into this term and the Council is moving forward to get the job done for our community.

As I travel around our City attending events and functions, speaking to residents, business owners and sporting clubs, there is a real buzz and confidence that the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters is on the move.

A number of capital projects are either now complete, or well down the track to completion, demonstrating the Council's strong commitment to providing high quality facilities for our community. In January, the \$1.45 million Dunstan Adventure Playground in St Peters was completed. The Premier of South Australia the Hon Peter Malinauskas MP, joined me to officially open this iconic play space.

The new clubrooms at Cruickshank Reserve, Maylands, were opened in May, providing better amenities for netball and tennis players and officials.

The long-awaited \$4.2 million upgrade of Burchell Reserve, St Peters, is also progressing well and will be officially

open in Spring, while Stages 2 & 3 of the \$20 million Trinity Valley Drainage Upgrade have just been completed and work is set to start on St Morris Reserve later this year as part of Stage 4.

Finally, work on the \$60 million redevelopment of the Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre commenced in February. This is the biggest and most exciting capital project ever undertaken by the Council and will be the jewel in the crown for our City and indeed, the eastern suburbs.

Once completed, every citizen of our City should feel very proud of what will undoubtedly be one of the best swimming centres in Adelaide and it's located in our very own backyard!

In April, the 2024 AFL Gather Round once again saw The Parade come alive with two matches played at Norwood Oval and the return of the Norwood Food & Wine Festival. It was fantastic to see so many locals and visitors from interstate come to South Australia's Premier Mainstreet and enjoy an incredible weekend of activity showcasing our hospitality scene.

Following on from last year's success, the economic impact of the AFL Gather Round went to another level. Spendmapp data showed that between Friday 5 April and Sunday 7 April, spending on food and beverages across our City was \$6.6 million compared to \$4.45 million in 2023. Of that figure, \$3.7 million was spent in the suburb of Norwood, up from \$2.2 million last year. Naturally, the Council is keen to build on this success and has resolved to register its interest with the AFL and the State Government for Norwood Oval to again host matches as part of the 2025 AFL Gather Round.

The success of events such as the AFL Gather Round are the result of the Council moving quickly and with confidence and conviction—to take advantage of unique opportunities as they arise—with the clear aim of providing economic, social and cultural benefits to all those who live, work and play in our City.

To quote Local Government Association of South Australia President Dean Johnson, "Local Government is much more than dollars and cents on a spreadsheet."

At its core, Local Government is about improving the quality of life for communities. It therefore makes no sense for the Council to sit back, play it safe and do nothing out of fear it will make a mistake or be criticised by our community, or the media, for spending money on infrastructure and major events.

Our citizens work hard for their money to contribute to the Council's budget, so it is only fair that in return the Council ensures the money in the budget works hard for them.

It is in that spirit that the Council has developed its 2024–2025 Budget, which has, at its foundation, an ongoing commitment to providing a range of high quality services and programs, while delivering a sustainable asset renewal and capital works program.

2024 AFL Gather Round on The Parade

*Millions of dollars
pour into our City*

Not only did our City host two thrilling AFL matches, the Norwood Food & Wine Festival and promote our local eateries and traders to the nation, the 2024 AFL Gather Round in April also delivered significant economic benefits.

More than 18,000 fans packed Norwood Oval over the Gather Round weekend for the two AFL matches. The Brisbane Lions kicking off a convincing win over North Melbourne in front of 9,037 fans on Friday 5 April, while 9,425 footy fans enjoyed watching St Kilda defeat Richmond on Sunday 7 April.

South Australia's Premier Mainstreet, The Parade, was once again home to the Norwood Food & Wine Festival after a 12 year break, transforming The Parade into a buzzing hub for foodies and music lovers.

With our best local food and beverage producers mixing with traders from across the State, festival attendees were spoilt for choice as they waited for ARIA award-winning band The Temper Trap to take to the stage just after sunset.





The Festival also included live DJ sets and bands, large TV screens showing the footy and packed pubs, restaurants, shops and other venues.

It is estimated that over 70,000 people enjoyed the festivities throughout the day.

The Spendmapp* data for the month of April 2024 shows the City and in particular the suburb of Norwood, benefitted from an increase in spending this year compared to in 2023.

The total spend for the entire City over the three days was \$17.6 million compared to \$14.2 million in 2023.

And City-wide spending in the Dining and Hospitality category was \$6.6 million this year compared to \$4.45 million in 2023.

Dining and Hospitality spending in the suburb of Norwood reached \$3.7 million compared to \$2.2 million in 2023.

The massive increase in spending this year is testament to the momentum of the AFL Gather Round and of course, the popularity of The Parade and The Norwood Food & Wine Festival.

The high percentage of spending coming from visitors, rather than locals, reinforces the success of the AFL Gather Round and how it attracts people from interstate to the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters.

The AFL Gather Round will return to South Australia next season, with the State Government locking in the concept until the end of 2026.

Recently, the Council resolved to express its interest with the AFL and the State Government for Norwood Oval to host matches at next year's AFL Gather Round and has allocated \$200,000 in its 2024–2025 budget for activations and events.

A day of fun and celebration

Dunstan Adventure Playground official opening

With free gelato, hot chips and glorious weather, the official opening of the redeveloped Dunstan Adventure Playground was a resounding success.

Thank you to everyone who came along to the event and tried out the adventure themed play equipment including the big slippery slide and the flying fox.

Premier Peter Malinauskas—who officially opened the park with Mayor Robert Bria on Saturday 3 February—and his young family were one of hundreds of guests who enjoyed the celebrations and relished in the history of the park, which was first built in 1976, at the suggestion of then Premier, Don Dunstan.

Official proceedings also included Kaurna Elder, Rosalind Coleman who performed the official Welcome to Country which was followed by a smoking ceremony and the playing of a didgeridoo. To reflect the Kaurna People as the traditional owners of the Adelaide Plains, there are Kaurna cultural references throughout the new playground.

Fittingly, there are also tributes and acknowledgements for Premier Dunstan located throughout the park, in particular, the below iconic image of the former Premier wearing his famous flares and a turtle-neck jumper on the flying fox.

When the playground was first built, it cost approximately \$12,000 and was largely made of metal.

Speaking at this year's official opening, Mayor Bria told the crowd while the new playground was welcomed by the local community, it was not long before it attracted the attention of interstate media.

In November 1978, the playground was discussed in the 'Canberra Times' in an article titled, 'What about games with risk.' The Canberra Times reported: "The Don Dunstan Adventure Playground in Adelaide provides some high-risk activities, including a flying fox. It is interesting to note that though the playground is used mainly by children, adults have featured more prominently in the few accidents that have occurred."

Looking towards the future, the Council is extremely confident the former Premier would be proud of the redevelopment which includes an:

- adventure-themed play equipment, including a 32-metre flying fox;
- 19-metre slide;
- in-ground trampolines;
- sensory elements;
- barbecue, picnic areas, toilets;
- park furniture;
- landscaping, irrigation;
- bank improvements to reduce soil erosion; and
- path lighting and better path connections between the Linear Park and Eleventh Avenue and Winchester Street.

The \$1.45 million upgrade included a funding contribution of \$450,000 from the State Government's *Open Space Grant Program* with the remainder funded by the Council.

Trinity Valley Drainage Upgrade

Project Update

As part of its multi-million dollar Trinity Valley Drainage Upgrade, the Council is installing new infrastructure that will significantly reduce the risk of flooding to properties within the suburbs of St Morris, Trinity Gardens, Maylands and Stepney (known collectively as the 'Trinity Valley').

Stages 2 and 3 of the four stage project have recently been completed. Stages 1 and 4 will be undertaken during the 2024–2025 financial year.

Stage 2 involved the installation of large concrete culverts, pipes and pits within the roadway, followed by the reconstruction of the road pavement in Albermarle Avenue and Ashbrook Avenue, Trinity Gardens.

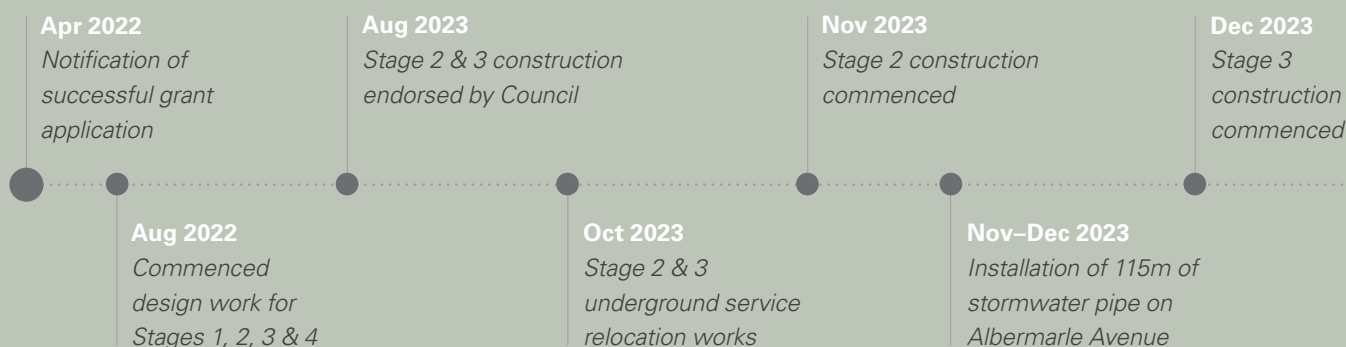
Stage 3 involved the installation of large concrete culverts, pipes and pits, followed by the reconstruction of the road pavement on Jones Avenue, Trinity Gardens.

The large culverts within the roadway in Albermarle Avenue and Jones Avenue, will provide underground detention storage and combined with the new stormwater pits and connections, will capture and detain surface water that would otherwise flood residential properties in major storm events.

The Trinity Valley Drainage Upgrade Project received funding from the Federal Government, through a \$9.9 million grant from the *Preparing Australia Communities Program*, which targets projects that improve resilience against natural disasters. The grant is being matched dollar-for-dollar by the Council.

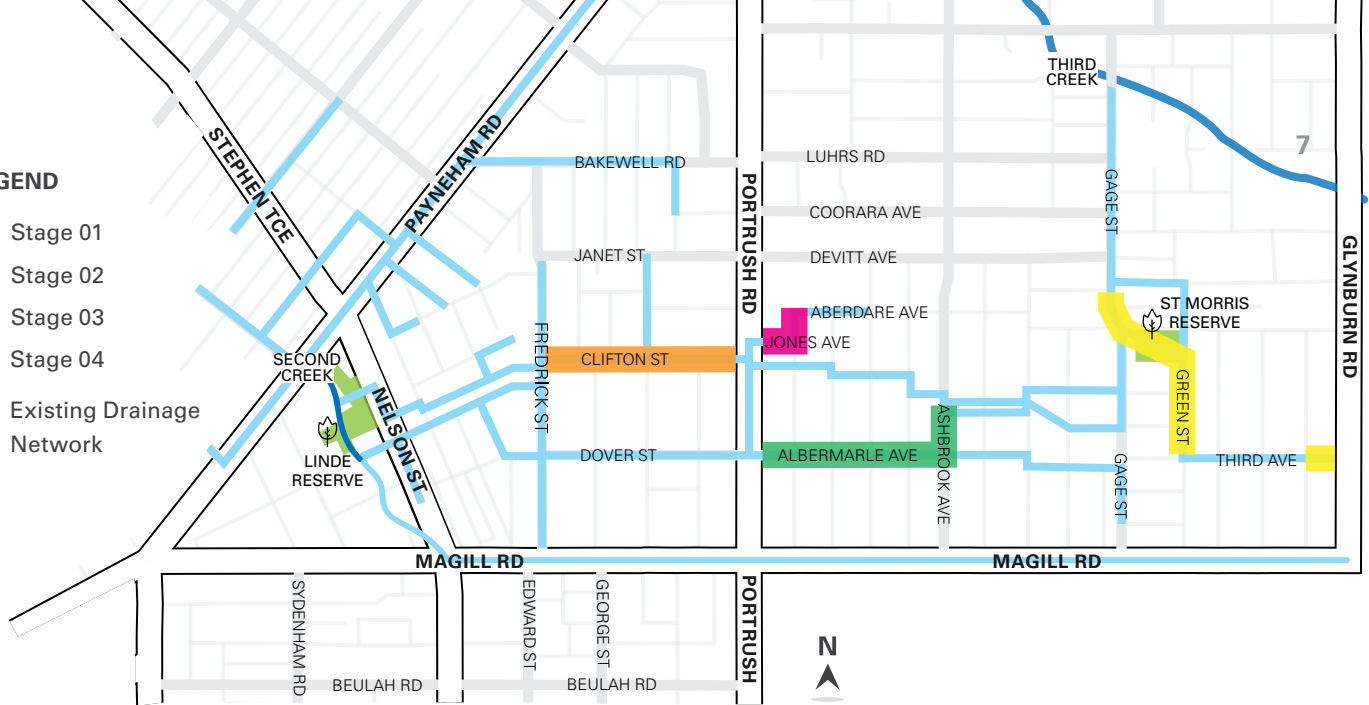


Project timeline

The next stage of the project, Stage 4 includes new drainage infrastructure in Gage Street and Green Street, St Morris and includes the redevelopment of St Morris Reserve which will include a stormwater detention basin. Work on Stage 4, is scheduled to commence later this year.

Stage 1, the final stage of the upgrade, includes new drainage in the suburbs of Maylands and Stepney and is scheduled to commence in early 2025.

Major Project Updates

The City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters has been a hive of activity with the construction of new sports and community facilities. These major projects not only benefit residents and visitors but create jobs during construction and provide an overall boost to our City's local economy.



The Payneham Memorial Swimming Pool was first opened in 1968 by the former Payneham Council and despite several repairs and plant replacement over the years, the Pool had reached the end of its useful life and was in need of significant investment.

Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre Redevelopment

The transformation of the Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre into a contemporary and modern aquatic leisure centre has already commenced with on-site work well underway at 194 OG Road, Felixstow.

In early 2024, the Council awarded the construction contract to South Australian-based Badge Constructions, creating 100 jobs during the construction phase.

The new project—which is estimated to cost \$60 million—is the City's biggest infrastructure investment in the history of the Council. Each of the three new pools will have an all-access entry ramp or lift, and aquatic wheelchairs will be available for public use.

The Centre's funding includes a \$5.6 million grant from the State Government's *Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program*.

The redevelopment includes the following new features...

50 metre outdoor pool with 10 lanes

25 metre indoor pool with 8 lanes

11 x 20 metre indoor learner's pool

14 metre tall tower with two outdoor waterslides

Multiple male, female and unisex all-access changerooms with showers, toilets and lockers

Multipurpose meeting room

Shade shelters and picnic seating



Cruickshank Reserve Facility Upgrade

The new clubrooms at Cruickshank Reserve, Maylands, were officially opened to the public on Saturday 25 May.

The redevelopment—which was supported by \$888,786 from the Federal Government under the *Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program* and \$460,000 from the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters—includes a new clubroom, two unisex change rooms and toilets, a canteen, an office, storerooms and two public toilets.

The upgrade is of particular importance for the Maylands Sports Centre, St Peters Tennis Club and the Gems Netball Club, all of whom use the Reserve for training, games and community activities.

The Reserve was named after Robert Cruickshank, who was born in 1865. A solicitor and authority on shipping law, Mr Cruickshank was a keen sportsman who lived in Augusta Street, Maylands and was very active in the community. A Councillor for the Maylands Ward,

Mayor of St Peters and a member of the Board of Governors of the Public Library, Museum and Art Gallery, he was very prominent figure. In 1912, the St Peters Council purchased part of a cow paddock and named it 'Cruickshank Reserve' in recognition of Mr Cruickshank's valuable service to the Council and community.

Burchell Reserve Redevelopment

The community is encouraged to visit Burchell Reserve, in St Peters, following its \$4.2 million upgrade, and try out some of its new features!

The redevelopment of the Reserve includes multi-use community courts (for tennis, basketball and netball), playground equipment, toilets, landscaping, shelter, picnic settings and barbeques.

An official opening for the whole community will be held later in the year and details of the event will be available on the Council's website closer to the date.

The Taco of the Town

Hall of Fame winner Chile Mojo

You can't grow a Mexican chilli outside of Mexico, but you can bring the very best flavours of Mexico to the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters.

And that is exactly what husband and wife Joel Adams and Morgen Britt did just a little over 20 years ago when they started Chile Mojo.

"When we came to Australia from Seattle, Mexico's world class cuisine was severely under-represented. I have always had an interest in Mexican food. It is part of the fabric of American cooking." Joel says.

In order to quench their burning desire for all things Mexican—from chillis, tacos, chile rellenos, fajitas, pozole, hot sauces, burritos—Joel and Morgen did something very unusual.

"We built a store, put it in a box and shipped it here from Seattle."

"It wasn't easy and there were many tricks and hurdles, but we made it work. And key to this is that we found a good location on The Parade to launch our store."

In their endearing quirky manner, they named the shop after themselves—with the 'Mo' in MoJo representing the first two letters of Morgen's name—likewise the 'Jo' representing Joel's name.

Their iconic and much-loved business moved to Magill Road in 2009, and has gone on to become an institution in our City. Chile Mojo was inducted into the Hall of Fame at this year's Eastside Business Awards.

Chile Mojo isn't an ordinary supermarket. It is a Mexican wonderland—bursting with colour and a collection of delights from Scorpion filled lollipops, sombreros, corn chips, chillies, to ingredients for the most discerning of chefs.

Joel, who has a background working in kitchens, boasts he has cooked 600,000 meals on the flame grill alone, and has swiped his knife 3.2 million times just making pico de gallo salsa!

However, his favourite part of his job is chatting to customers.

"We have a lot of people coming in who want to try cooking Mexican food for the first time, or they may want to eat the

hottest chilli, and my advice for them is, don't take the leap from Tabasco sauce straight to the deep end," he says with a wry smile.

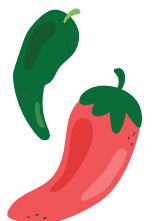

Pleasingly, the business which has three full time staff is growing and Joel and Morgen have plans to expand in the future.

Meet our Volunteers

Melville & Daniel Rowe



Like birds of a feather, Melville and his son Daniel, flock together to keep the streets of the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters clean from graffiti.

Melville has been in the volunteering role since 2005 when he left the Adelaide Zoo where he held his dream job of being a zoo-keeper for more than 20 years.

“Every animal had their own peculiarities and personalities. I started in the bird department and then moved to the mammal department eventually becoming a rover. But you wouldn’t have known I was there. It was mainly behind the scenes, just like graffiti removal really,” Melville said.

Melville likens the way vandals mark walls and buildings to the way animals spray to mark their territory.

“It might be arrogant or ego driven” Melville 64, said. “Other times it is just mindless squiggles and a waste of resources.”

Daniel, aged 21, decided to join his father when he was at a career crossroads and couldn’t decide whether to follow in his dad’s footsteps and work at the zoo or find an entirely new path.

“I am the only young person on the graffiti team, but I like to think of myself as being in a different bracket with different and new ideas.”

Daniel and Melville drive from their home in Hope Valley each Friday for their 3.5 hour volunteering shift, and are joined by Chris Levingston, who they both have formed a friendship with, particularly Melville.

“Since I started in 2005, I have worked with some very good people, but I am really happy with my crew now,” Melville says while giving Daniel a big smile.

It is obvious Melville and Daniel, who finish each other’s sentences, are very good friends.

Father and son agree that the best way to avoid a graffiti build up is to have it removed straight away.

They could also happily sit back and chat for an hour or two about the best cleaning graffiti removal products and their environment impacts.

The Council’s Coordinator, Volunteer Services Nigel Jordan says it is very uncommon to have a father and son Volunteer team and a search of the Council’s records indicate that Melville and Daniel are very likely to be the City’s first.

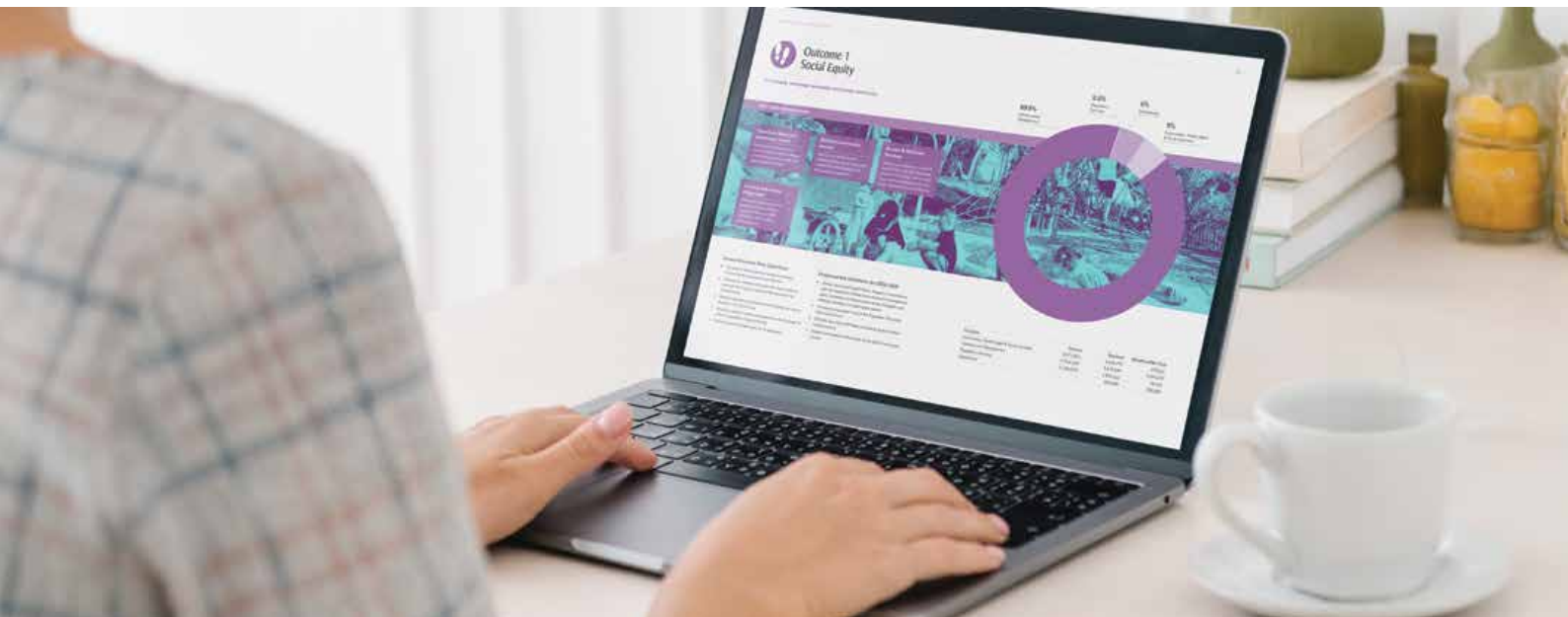

2024–2025 Annual Business Plan and Budget update

The draft 2024–2025 Annual Business Plan and Budget sets out how we propose to allocate our budget and resources to deliver key major projects, infrastructure upgrades, programs and services.

The Council acknowledges the current economic challenges of inflation and interest rates, both of which are contributing to cost of living pressures on households and individuals.

This scenario underscores the need to provide value for money in the infrastructure, services and programs which the Council delivers for our community.

At the time of going to print, the Council had completed three weeks of community consultation on its draft Annual Business Plan and Budget. A Public Information Night was also held on 27 May 2024.

In total, 30 submissions were received from citizens and 33 citizens attended the Public Information Night.

Careful consideration is always given when it comes to setting the residential (average) rate increase, as well as the commercial rate.

The rate increase will be considered and endorsed at the 1 July Council meeting.

The Council would like to thank all citizens who have shared their views on the draft 2024–2025 Annual Business Plan and Budget.



New rules to protect Adelaide's tree canopy

New planning regulations have been introduced by the State Government to better protect Adelaide's urban tree canopy.



The new regulations are aimed at protecting trees with a smaller trunk circumference. The trunk size for Regulated Trees will be reduced from two metres to one metre, while Significant Trees will be reduced from three metres to two metres.

Exemptions for trees based on distance from dwellings and swimming pools has also been reduced. Some trees within three metres from a home or pool, will be able to be removed without approval, whereas the old regulations allowed the removal of some trees within 10 metres.

The new regulations also strengthen pruning limits on regulated and significant trees allowing 30 percent of the tree's canopy to only be removed every five years.

Fees for destroying or removing protected trees will also increase, better reflecting the cost of tree replacement.

Offset fees for a Regulated Tree increase from \$326 to \$1,000 and from \$489 to \$1,500 for a Significant Tree.

Although the new regulations were introduced with immediate effect, existing Development Applications and approvals, will have 12 months before being impacted by these changes.

These changes recognise the important role Adelaide's mature trees play in promoting community wellbeing, supporting biodiversity and reducing the 'urban heat effect'.

Help Solve the Cultural Heritage Centre's History Mystery

The Council's Cultural Heritage Centre is home to some of our City's most interesting and thought-provoking items dating back to the Council's inception in 1853.

But it is a mysterious large box of items including photographs, letters, telegrams and drawings which is currently puzzling staff.



The box was left anonymously at the St Peters Library covered in dust. After lovingly cleaning each item, a Volunteer researched and sorted the treasure chest ascertaining that it depicted family and friends of Dutch heritage including a genealogical record dating back to the 1770s.

Someone really has put a lot of love into keeping this family history, and the records don't appear to have any connection to the Council. We would love to see them returned to the family or placed in a repository that cares for family histories.

Surnames appearing in the records include: Albrechtsens, Berkelsen, Conradsen, Hansen, Heggums, Holm, Larsen, Moller, Nielsen, Trolles, and others.

Since her childhood, Rachel High, has travelled long and far in order to reach her long-term ambition of being a performance artist.

In August, Rachel—who is the first person with Down Syndrome in Australia to graduate from university, completing her Bachelor of Arts (Drama)—will debut her self-inspired theatre performance, aptly titled *HIGH*.

The multi-faceted artist, who works with No Strings Attached Theatre of Disability, based in Stepney, was recently successful in securing funding from the Council's Community Grant Funding Program. The funds will contribute towards Rachel's artistic development in relation to *HIGH*, which she co-wrote and will be co-directing with local director Lisa Lanzi. *HIGH* is also her first major lead performance and the major production for No Strings Attached for 2024.

Rachel says *HIGH* is the culmination of her childhood journeys, in which she lived in Port Augusta and would catch the bus to Adelaide weekly so she could attend theatre workshops, an experience deeply etched in her mind and one she describes as "exhausting".

"My love of theatre happened when I was young, and developed over the past 25 years." Rachel says.

While Rachel has achieved many notches in her belt—including making a satirical film about Australian animals titled *Brown the Dirt*—she also currently works at Flinders University as a Community Researcher, providing her the opportunity to act as a disability advocate.

"It involves the understanding of my personal experience so I can bring it to support people with disabilities." Rachel says humbly.

But it is clear that *HIGH* is Rachel's true calling—her artistic manifesto. "*HIGH* is something that I will be proud to achieve."

"I am pleased to share this story because I want people to understand me, to hear about my educational journey, to learn about my challenges and about my learning style."

And there are still plenty of high roads for Rachel to take. "I would be happy to work in film in America or London." Rachel says with a cheeky grin. *HIGH* is on at the Space Theatre from 29 to 31 August 2024.

Community Survey

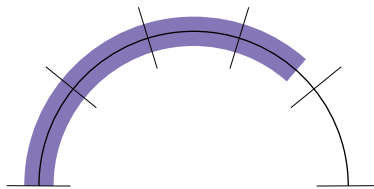
The biennial Community Survey was undertaken in late 2023 and early 2024, with face-to-face interviews and online consultation with more than 600 citizens and business operators in our City.

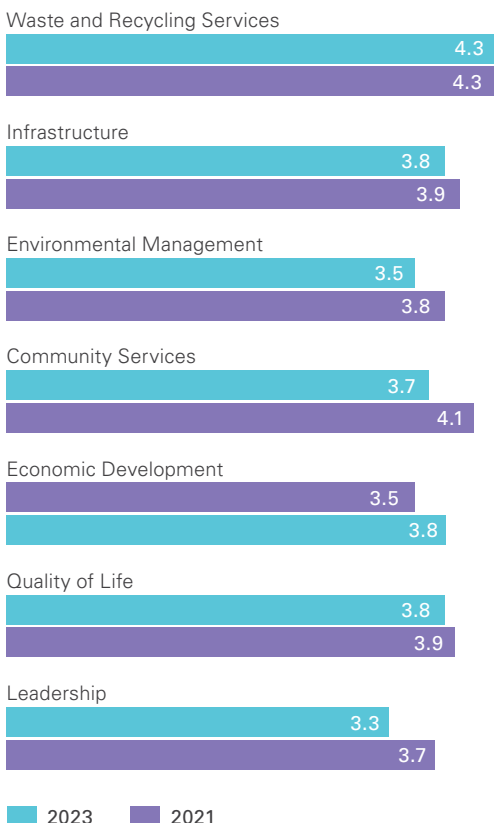
Overall satisfaction

Overall satisfaction levels from residents slightly decreased from 3.9 to 3.7 out of 5 in 2023.

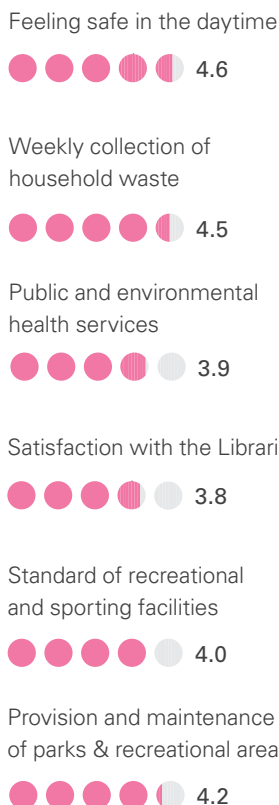

Satisfaction with specific issues



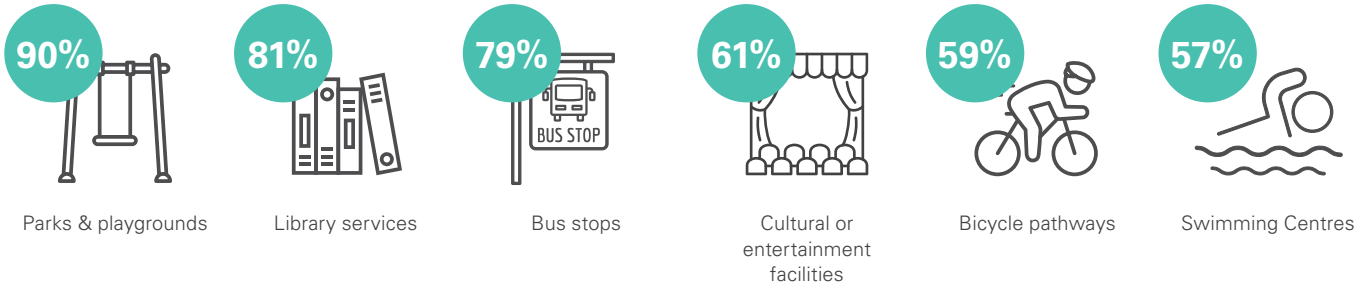
How residents receive information



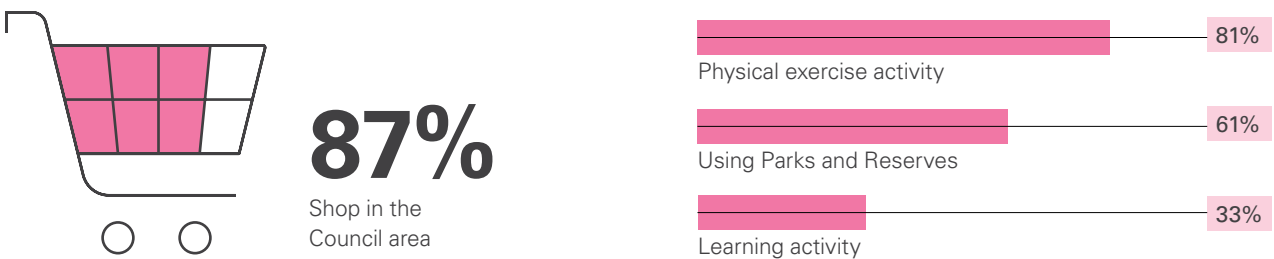
The Community Survey asks how satisfied people are with the various services, programs and facilities the Council provides, together with other questions that affect overall quality of life in the City.

Use of the Council services or facilities

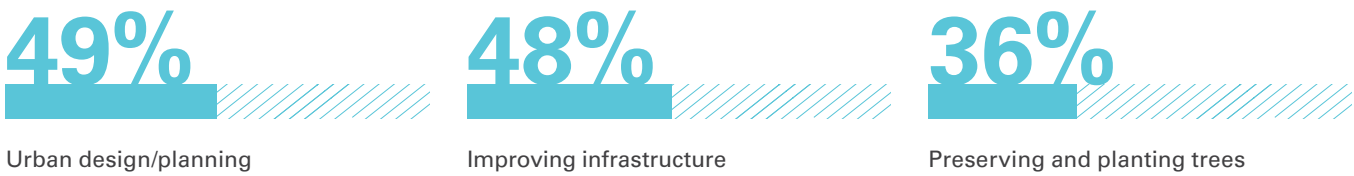


Weekly participation in activities in the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters

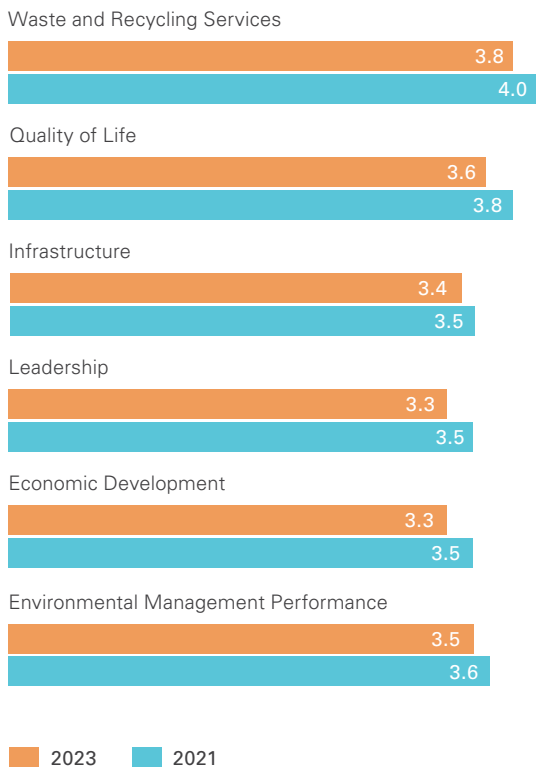

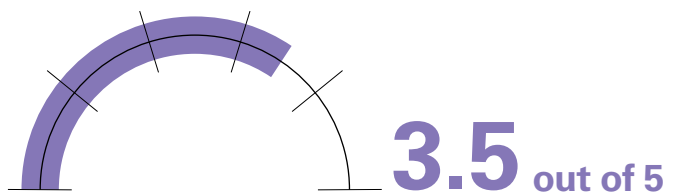

The Business Survey results show an increase in the Council's performance in the following areas:

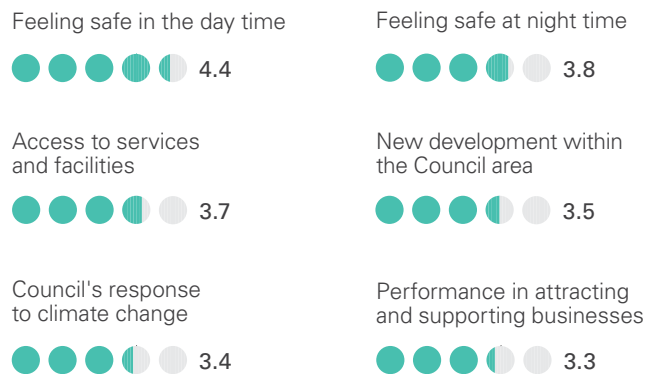


Overall satisfaction

Satisfaction with specific issues



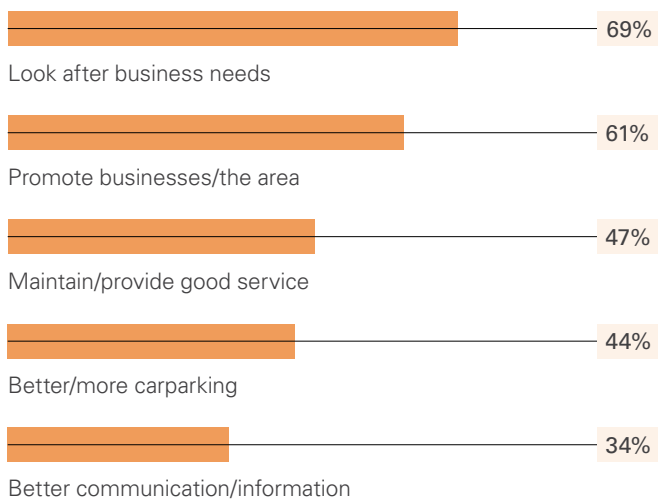

Addressing carparking

Carparking is a difficult issue to resolve as our residents and business often have competing expectations. Seeking to strive a balance, the Council has recently undertaken consultation on its draft On-street Parking Policy.

Once the submissions have been analysed the Council will implement a City-wide parking policy which will aim to alleviate business and residents concerns in relation to long-term commuter parking in residential streets.
