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05. Winds of Change

## 08. From the Shadows 1600

The deep shadows cast by the dunes offer a welcome respite from the intense summer sun, creating a tranquil contrast with the sunlit beach and dunes beyond. Inspired by the rich, nuanced colours of the sand in shadow, this piece captures the striking interplay between light and darkness. The brilliant highlights of the sun-drenched dunes stand in sharp relief to the cool, muted tones of the shaded sand, reminding us that in order to truly appreciate the warmth of the light, we must also embrace the quiet depth of the shadows.

09. *Zepher* 900

Feel the gentle breeze and the warmth of the sun on your face as you step into this tranquil, impressionistic scene, inspired by the stunning Adelaide coastline. With soft, organic mark-making and a delicate use of light, the piece evokes the serene beauty of the shore, where land meets sea in a quiet harmony. The warm, sunlit hues and subtle textures transport you to a peaceful moment by the water, capturing the essence of the coastline's natural beauty and the soothing rhythms of the ocean.

## 10. Through the Hourglass

I am continually captivated by the coastal dune systems along our metropolitan coastline—the ever-shifting sand formations, the rich palette of colours, and the rugged, resilient vegetation that thrives in this dynamic environment. The dunes, constantly reshaped by the wind and tides, reveal a striking interplay of texture and form, while the hardy plants that call this place home offer a testament to nature's ability to adapt and endure. This landscape, both fragile and enduring, is a constant source of inspiration, inviting exploration of its raw beauty and the subtle complexity of life that flourishes in such an ever-changing terrain.

## 11. As the Tide Turned 980

This piece explores the striking granite formations of the Bay of Fires, where ancient rocks stand resilient against the ever-changing tides. The movement of the sea around these formations is both mesmerising and humbling, as the rocks, timeless yet transient, shift and weather under the constant forces of nature. Fascinated by the way these structures mark the transition between land, sea, and sky, this work reflects on the tension between solidity and impermanence, inviting the viewer to contemplate the enduring power and fragility of the natural world.

12. *Ebb and Flow* 980

The Bay of Fires, Tasmania, with its crystal-clear turquoise waters and vibrant rock pools, provided the inspiration for this piece. The stunning orange-tinged granite formations, weathered by time and tide, anchor the composition, while the gentle movement of the water around them evokes a sense of tranquility and rhythm. This work captures the unique beauty of Binalong Bay, where the elements meet in a delicate balance, and the natural world is in a constant state of flux.

13. Of Wind and Wave

Through dynamic composition and texture, the work invites the viewer to contemplate the ever-changing yet enduring beauty of this rugged coastal landscape.

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
